
A celebration of India through faith, the arts and our shared universal values.

**Books** Celebrating the launch of two new Fons Vitae titles

1) Merton & Hinduism: The Yoga of the Heart, the ninth and final volume of the acclaimed Fons Vitae Thomas Merton Series, and the first book to thoroughly and definitively trace the lasting influence of Yoga and the Hindu tradition on the life and writings of the renowned author, Thomas Merton, Catholic Priest and pioneer of inter-religious dialogue.



2) A new translated interpretation: "What Wants To Come Through Me Now" of Rabindranath Tagore's Gitanjali (Song Offerings) by Coleman Barks. Barks, known and loved for his exquisite transmissions of Rumi, opens us up to the heart of the Bengali poet and mystic, Rabindranath Tagore. Hailed by poets from Hart Crane to Robert Frost, Yeats's personal response perhaps sums up the empathy the Western literary community felt when it first received Tagore's Nobel Prize winning work in 1913: "A whole people, a whole civilization, immeasurably strange to us, seems to have been taken up into this imagination, and yet we are not moved because of its strangeness, but because we have met our own image...or heard, perhaps for the first time, in literature, our voice as in a dream" (Yeats, 11). # **DANCE**

"Swagatam Krishna" – a rendition in the ancient dance form of Bharatnatyam by the students of Samarpan, School of Art. They say, "Dear Krishna! Welcome into our homes, welcome into our hearts and enrich our soul. The One that resides in Mathura, One who exudes tenderness and compassion to the good and is fierce and destructive to the evil. Welcome! The dancers depict these very characteristics of chivalry and charm of Lord Krishna from Lord Krishna's life story, Srimad Bhagavatham. The piece concludes with a stanza from the Bhagvad Gita.





**GANDHI.** Directed by Richard Attenborough Sunday, November 14, 3pm.

Winner of eight Oscars including Best Picture, the film celebrates the leadership of Mohandas K. Gandhi through nonviolent protest covering three major campaigns for freedom and equity.


**CHARULATA.** Directed by Satyajit Ray (Screened as last part of the INDIA celebration) Thursday, November 18, 2:15pm.

"An exquisitely traced drama of repressed desire." - Kate Muir, The Times (UK)

Based upon the novel Nastanirh by Rabindranath Tagore, this adaptation by Satyajit Ray on the surface addresses 19th-century values, but also incorporates political and colonial discourse, class, proto-feminist values, music, poetry, and love.

Charulata (Madhabi Mukherjee) is an isolated, artistically inclined woman who sees little of her busy journalist husband. Realizing that his wife is alienated and unhappy, he convinces his cousin Amal (Soumitra Chatterjee) to spend time with her and nourish her creative impulses.

Amal is a fledgling poet, and the two develop a bond over their shared love of art. Charulata finds herself creatively inspired and dangerously drawn to him.





### **EVENT SPEAKERS**



Renowned poet Coleman Barks, accompanied by sitar, tabla and sarod, will read from What Wants to Come Through Me Now, his interpretation of the Gitangali, a collection of poems by the Indian Mystic, Rabindranath Tagore. Coleman Barks (PhD) is an American poet known for making the poetry of Rumi widely accessible to the English-speaking world through his unique translations, including The Illuminated Rumi (1997), The Essential Rumi (1995), and several other volumes. Barks and his translation work have been featured in an episode of the PBS series "The Language of Life" with Bill Moyers, and in a televised conversation with the late poet, Mary Oliver. He has often produced his Rumi translations in collaboration with music and dance ensembles, including the Paul Winter Consort and Zuleikha.

**Lisa Starr,** is the former Poet Laureate of Rhode Island (2017-2013). She spent most of the last 35 years on Block Island, a tiny island off the Rhode Island coast, where she owned and operated a 10-room inn (The Hygeia House) and created and directed the Block Island Poetry Project. Starr is the recipient of numerous awards and fellowships, including the Rhode Island Fellowship in Poetry, which she received twice.

Starr's publications include three full-length collections, including Mad With Yellow (2008) and the anthology Where Beach Meets Ocean (2013). For the last 15 years she has traveled extensively, conducting workshops and giving readings with her long-time friend and companion, the Poet and Translator Coleman Barks. Starr is also collaborating with Barks on a memoir about grief, friendship, poetry and their beloved friend, Mary Oliver tentatively titled Three Years Without Mary. Starr is currently the Creative Director for The Arts Café Mystic.



**Robert Thurman,** is an American Buddhist author and academic who has written, edited, and translated several books on Tibetan Buddhism. He was the Je Tsongkhapa Professor of Indo-Tibetan Buddhist Studies at Columbia University, before retiring in June 2019. Robert Thurman held the first endowed chair in Buddhist Studies in the West. He also is the co-founder and president of Tibet House in New York. He translated the Vimalakirti Sutrafrom the Tibetan Kanjur into English. He is the father of actress Uma Thurman.

**Brother Paul Quenon will speak on Merton and Yoga and the Bhagavad Gita.** He has been a monk at the Abbey of Gethsemani for 62 years. Fr. Louis (Thomas Merton) was his Novice Master for over two years. Later he attended many of Merton's monastic conferences given for those in formation. Quenon earned a Master's degree in Systematic Theology from Catholic Theological Union in Chicago. Br. Paul has published seven books of poetry.

**David M. Odorisio, PhD,** serves as Director of The Retreat at Pacifica Graduate Institute, Santa Barbara, CA, and is Associate Core Faculty in Pacifica's Mythological Studies graduate degree program. He is editor of Merton and Hinduism: The Yoga of the Heart (Fons Vitae, 2021), and co-editor of the volume Depth Psychology and Mysticism (Palgrave Macmillan, 2018).

**Jonathan Montaldo** is the Co-General Editor with Gray Henry of Fons Vitae's Merton & World Religions Series. He and Gray also edited We Are Already One: Reflections to Celebrate Thomas Merton's Centenary (2015). He has served on the staff of Bellarmine University's Thomas Merton Center and the Merton Institute for Contemplative Living. He is the reader of five Merton audiobooks and has edited numerous volumes presenting Merton's work that include The Intimate Merton and A Year with Thomas Merton. With Robert G. Toth he created the ten volumes of Bridges to Contemplative Living with Thomas Merton for small group dialogue. He was President of the International Thomas Merton Society for the 2001–2003 administration.

Christopher Key Chapple, Phd, presenting Thomas Merton and the Bhagavad Gita, is Doshi Professor of Indic and Comparative Theology and founding Director of the Master of Arts in Yoga Studies at Loyola Marymount University in Los Angeles. A specialist in the religions of India, he has published more than twenty books, including the recent Living Landscapes: Meditations on the Elements in Hindu, Buddhist, and Jain Yogas (SUNY Press). He serves as advisor to multiple organizations including the Forum on Religion and Ecology (Yale), the Ahimsa Center (Pomona), the Dharma Academy of North America (Berkeley), the Jain Studies Centre (SOAS, London), the South Asian Studies Association, and International School for Jain Studies (New Delhi).

Francis X. Clooney, Phd, presenting Merton and Mahanambrata Brahmachari, is Catholic priest and member of the Society of Jesus who joined the Harvard Divinity faculty in 2005 after teaching for 21 years at Boston College. His primary Indological scholarship relates to theological commentarial writings in the Sanskrit and Tamil traditions of Hindu India. He is a leading figure in the field of comparative theology – faith seeking understanding through the study of traditions other than one's own. Recent books include Reading the Hindu and Christian Classics: Why and How It Matters (2019) and Western Jesuit Scholars in India: Tracing Their Paths, Reassessing Their Goals (2020). He is currently President-Elect of the Catholic Theological Society of America, and will be President during 2022–23.

**Emile Farge, Phd, who will speak on Merton & Indian guru Paramahansa Yogananda,** served as a Catholic priest from 1960 to 1971, during which time he read and admired Thomas Merton. After returning to lay life, he earned his PhD and was a public health official for 24 years. He returned to serious reading of Merton in 2001, and is currently a member of the Atlanta chapter of the International Thomas Merton society.

**Pico lyer** was educated at Eton and Oxford and since 1982 has been a full-time writer, publishing 15 books, translated into 23 languages, on subjects ranging from the Dalai Lama to globalism, from the Cuban Revolution to Islamic mysticism. They include such long-running sellers as Video Night in Kathmandu, The Lady and the Monk, The Global Soul, The Open Road and The Art of Stillness. His four talks for TED have received more than 10 million views so far. Since 1992 Iyer has spent much of his time at a Benedictine hermitage in Big Sur, California, and most of the rest in suburban Japan.

**Paul R. Dekar, Phd, presenting Merton and Gandhi** is Professor Emeritus of Evangelism and Mission, Memphis Theological Seminary. He teaches, writes, and volunteers with various organizations including Dundas [Ontario] Community Services and the Canadian Yearly Meeting of the Religious Society of Friends. He is the author of Thomas Merton, Twentieth Century Wisdom for Twenty-First Century Living, and Thomas Merton: God's Messenger on the Road Towards a New World.

**Paul M. Pearson** is Director of the Thomas Merton Center at Bellarmine University in Louisville, Kentucky and Chief of Research for the Merton Legacy Trust. He is Resident Secretary of the International Thomas Merton Society, and served as President for the 10th administration. Paul is a founding member and first secretary of the Thomas Merton Society of Great Britain and Ireland. He edited Seeking Paradise: Thomas Merton and the Shakers, A Meeting of Angels: The Correspondence of Thomas Merton with Edward Deming and Faith Andrews, Thomas Merton on Christian Contemplation and, most recently, Beholding Paradise: The Photographs of Thomas Merton.

William Apel, Phd, will present on Merton and Tagore and Expansive Hindu: Thomas Merton and Amiya Chakaravarty is Professor Emeritus of Religious Studies at Linfield College. He holds a PhD from Northwest University, and an MDiv from Garrett Theological Seminary.

# MUSICIANS | (Radiance music group)

**Joanna Mack** began her pursuit of Classical North Indian Music in 1997. While studying Neuroscience at UCSD, she attended a Classical Indian Music class with sitar virtuoso Kartik Seshadri, a senior disciple of Pandit Ravi Shankar of the Maihar Gharana. She had been involved in Western music since childhood but was immediately drawn to Indian music. Joanna is fulfilling that promise today. Joanna was fortunate to be able to study under the now late Ustad Ali Akbar Khan.

**Bruce Hamm** is a long time disciple of the great sarod master Ustad Ali Akbar Khan. Born into a musical family and immersed in music since early childhood, Bruce began his studies with Khansahib at the Ali Akbar College in 1974. He has pursued a serious and continuous study of instrumental and vocal music since then. In 1981 he performed the traditional thread tying ceremony to symbolize his bond to his Guru. Since that time he has been a regular teacher of instrumental and vocal classes at the AACM. Bruce continues his mentor's legacy today as a respected teacher and performer, mesmerizing crowds worldwide and keeping alive the tradition of the Maihar Gharana.

Marcus Wise is a top-tier tabla player, poetic and genre-bending. An ambassador of Eastern classical music, he makes Indian sounds accessible to American music fans, collaborating with folk, jazz, gospel and pop artists. He has performed and recorded with such artists as The Doors' John Densmore, sitar player David Whetstone, R&B singer Alexander O'Neal, classical Indian musician Nirmala Rajasekar, jazz artist Anthony Cox, cellist David Darling, sarod player Bruce Hamm and pop producer Jimmy Jam (Janet Jackson, Chaka Khan, Mary J. Blige). One of the first profesisonal tabla players in the United States, Marcus has been playing for over 35 years. He makes his home in Jaipur.
